THE CHAIRMAN'S CORNER

When my son was younger, we practically lived at the baseball park. Never an All-Star, Benjamin just loved the game. We endured scorching heat and exhausting nights for the blessings of fun and friendship.

Years later, I can still smell the sweaty leather, hear the ding of aluminum bats and feel the grit of red dust in my teeth. Seeing kids shag fly balls through a blurry lens of chainlink fence brings back a flood of memories.

One ballpark sight, however, was always discouraging. Despite there being 55-gallon trash cans at every field, the bleachers (and ground under them) were littered with cups, cardboard trays, plastic bags and sticky condiment packets.

Is it really that difficult to carry a hotdog wrapper 10 feet?

Looking back, the tragedy of this thoughtless littering wasn't just that maintenance people had to work harder, or that some debris was swept by the wind into nearby woods. Rather, it was the lesson it taught impressionable young people.

At a time when adults should have been teaching sportsmanship, teamwork, dedication and resilience, some were modeling a lazy, careless and self-centered attitude.

What a lost opportunity!

One afternoon at the ballpark, I began climbing bleachers and crawling underneath to collect discarded trash. I did this not only to clean the grounds, but also to teach Benjamin about stewardship and responsibility.

That's not to say I always remember to pick up after myself or than my son consistently applies this lesson. But it does remind us of the importance of education.

Imagine how much more beautiful Alabama could be if we just cleaned up on own messes?

While we love to celebrate the hard work of Alabama PALS volunteers in surpassing prior year litter collection totals, our ultimate goal should be to work ourselves out of a job.

Just like I couldn't keep up with the number of soft drink cups, candy wrappers and food containers being tossed under the bleachers, Alabama PALS will never be able to eradicate litter through cleanups alone.

We must continue to teach the next generation the shared responsibility we have for our environment. Stewardship must become a habit — like wearing a seatbelt.

Our Clean Campus program is reaching thousands of schoolchildren with these lessons, but we can all do our part.

As you maintain your adopted miles or conduct cleanups, make sure it's not just an activity. Take a few moments to talk about WHY we do the things we do. Most importantly, let's continue to set the example for litter prevention, not just at organized events, but also in personal lives — on vacation, in parking lots, during our cookouts, even at the ballpark.



Most recently, the Jane B. Holmes Public Library in Helena featured a local awareness campaign as a fun way to address litter and generate publicity for Alabama PALS's events and programs.

While looking for new ideas to engage patrons, the Programming Department at the Helena Library ran across the newly produced Alabama PALS Clean Campus video. After contacting me at PALS for more info, an idea took shape: getting the word out about litter control by reaching some of Alabama's dedicated citizens, library patrons!

The library featured an event for kids where if they checked out 10 books, they received a prize. This prize was a bag with information about Alabama's litter problem and how to help. Information about PALS was also available in the library foyer and presented to members of the Library Board.

Finally, the library offered a link on their website so local schools, patrons and the public could view the PALS Clean Campus Video. Bessemer City Middle School Joins Clean Campus Progam

Iabama PALS is pleased to welcome Bessemer City Middle School to the Clean Campus Program. The seventh-grade students at Bessemer City Middle recently had the opportunity to meet with me for a virtual lesson on the environment. The presentation included information about the negative effects of pollution, and the students also learned about how much time it takes for items that we normally throw away in the trash to biodegrade. Many students do not realize that once the "garbage truck" picks up their trash, it goes to a landfill to be buried.

After our Zoom call, the students brainstormed using all the information they had been given. Some of the ideas the students decided to pursue were as follows: starting a Clean Campus Group at the school with the supplies provided by Alabama PALS and starting a recycling program on campus. In fact, they have already contacted their local waste vendor about starting the recycling program! As soon as they get the necessary approval from their school district, they will begin by collecting aluminum cans and plastic drink containers.

The students also discussed the long-term goal of applying for the Adopt-a-Mile program so they can have more outreach in the community. The Adopt-a-Mile signs are a great way for local residents to be reminded of the importance of good environmental stewardship and that people of all ages can make a difference. The students at BCMS also plan to reach out to local businesses to help make some of their ideas come to fruition systemwide! These students are reimagining Bessemer to become a truly litter-free community!

East Elementary Joins the Clean Campus Program

ast Elementary is a beautiful school with a rich history, located in the historical area of Cullman, Alabama. The teachers and staff, led by Principal David Wiggins, understand the importance of teaching East Elementary's second- through sixthgrade students how to take care of their campus. For years, East Elementary has participated in Alabama PALS's Clean Campus Program. This year they claimed third place in the statewide clean campus scrapbook contest and were awarded a \$500 scholarship for their efforts. Clean Campus sponsor Mrs. April Dean, nicknamed "Clean Dean," attributes their success to the entire East Elementary community comprised of school administration, teachers, students and parents, who enthusiastically pitch in with the Clean Campus effort.

This year, Mrs. Dean organized a Halloween Recycled Cardboard Challenge in which students created haunted houses, costume props and even socially distant candy distributors – all from recycled cardboard. At Thanksgiving, East Elementary fourth-graders studied the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade, created their own floats from recycled materials, and held a parade for students and parents to come and watch.

East Elementary's Clean Campus Program encourages students to not only recycle plastic bottles, aluminum and paper but also more unusual items like crayons, markers and grocery sacks. This year, they are holding a Clean Campus fundraiser with recycled crayons that students have melted and molded into new crayons shaped like hearts, pineapples and even Legos. These new and improved crayons will be sold for 50 cents each, and funds will be contributed to furthering East Elementary's Clean Campus Program.

Representing UNIT-ED was Andy Britton, Central Region Director of Public Affairs and Communication, who shared with the 25 community college presidents the impact of the College Campus Clean-up program which includes the Alabama People Against A Littered State (PALS), the Alabama Community College System and Coca-Cola UNITED. The 2021 Spring event resulted in the largest number of participants and the greatest number of pounds of litter and recyclables in the history of the event. Later this Fall, two scholarships will be presented to participating community colleges, one for the



campus collecting the most litter and another for the institution collecting the most recyclables. The scholarships will be awarded as part of the Governor's Awards ceremony during the annual PALS meeting in Montgomery.

On Saturday, September 19, 2020, thousands of volunteers will descend on beaches, lakes, and streams of Alabama to remove trash and debris — on land and under the water. Volunteers of all ages will form the largest one-day volunteer event in the state on behalf of clean oceans and waterways — Alabama's Coastal Cleanup.

Pollution prevention is the key

Alabama's Coastal Cleanup isn't just about pollution cleanup — it's also about pollution prevention. The event focuses on educating and empowering people to become a part of the marine debris solution.

What makes the Alabama Coastal Cleanup unique is its data collection component. Volunteers record specific types of marine debris being found, allowing Ocean Conservancy, sponsor of the International Coastal Cleanup, to compile, analyze and track this data year-by-year and make discoveries about the behaviors that cause the debris.

The final information is used to educate the public, business, industry, and government officials about the problem. We believe understanding the problem is the key to finding long-lasting solutions.

Marine debris is dangerous

Animals are harmed and killed by marine debris. They get tangled in discarded fishing gear, and they ingest debris that can kill them. For example, a plastic sandwich bag floating in the ocean may look like a jellyfish, a favorite food of sea turtles. If a sea turtle tries to eat the bag it could block its throat or remain in the stomach making the turtle feel full, leading to starvation and death. Ending marine debris will help us all protect marine-life.

Ten things you can do to help prevent marine debris

1. Join Alabama's 33rd Annual Coastal Cleanup on September 19th.

2. Clean up your trash, even when not near the water. It's amazing that a vast majority of trash in our waterways comes from land-based activities. Even trash discarded miles inland can make it to the ocean, carried by the rain and the winds.

3. Retrieve your monofilament fishing line. Don't leave fishing line in the water and remove others' when you find it...being careful not to tug on snagged lines that could be caught on important habitat below the surface. Also be aware of hooks that may be left on the line.

4. Contain and properly clean spills when boating. Use oil-absorbent rags or even diapers to clean spills. Ocean Conservancy's Good Mate program can provide you with plenty of tips for reducing impact when on the water.

5. Recycle used motor oil and oil filters. Your local gas station should have facilities for recycling these materials. Never pour oil, paint, antifreeze, or other household chemicals into an open sewer.

6. Better yet, find alternatives to household chemicals. Don't use fertilizers, pesticides, and herbicides that can wash into open waters. Use lemon juice, vinegar, and baking soda for household cleaning.


 $7.\,Become\,a$ storm drain sentry. Stencil your local drains to remind people where the things they dump there end up...and of the potential consequences.


8. Use cloth bags for groceries. Take them with you when you shop to reduce the number of plastic bags you use. In addition to being ugly, plastic bags can choke marine wildlife when mistaken for food.


9. Properly dispose of used batteries and electronics. Use your local recycling center. Electronics leach harmful chemicals into the environment. Once there, these toxic pollutants can affect the environment for decades.

10. Contact your elected representatives. Let them know you care about the effects of marine debris and that you are watching what they do to stop it. Then, vote for candidates who support marine debris prevention and are good stewards of our ocean.
